Introduction

In 2007 I presented a lecture in the European School of Theosophy entitled *The Tears of the Muses*, inspired by the series of poems - *The Teares of the Muses* - written by the English poet Edmund Spenser (1552 - 1599). During that time my fascination with the subject lead me to make an extensive research about the Muses, which resulted in a booklet which yet has some pending revisions in order to be ready for publication.

During my research I found many glyphs associated with the Muses and decided that drawings would be necessary in order to better illustrate them. So I requested the help of Pericles Iordanides - a very sensitive artist who is also member of Hypatia lodge - to prepare a series of drawings depicting the Muses.

We sat together for hours while I described the images and he drew them. He would stop many times, for me to make corrections and this went on for three months till the entire collection was finalized.



Mnemosyne is the mother of the Muses - The Muse of Reminiscences. She is considered as the one who presides over time and is the inventor of languages.






Lesmosyne

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
Clio

The Vassals of God's Wrath, and Slaves of Sin....




Thalia

Marring my joyous gentle Dalliance....




Euterpe

From thence infused into mortal Brests



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
Calliope

Through Fleshes Frailty, and Deceit of Sin



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
Polyhymnia
